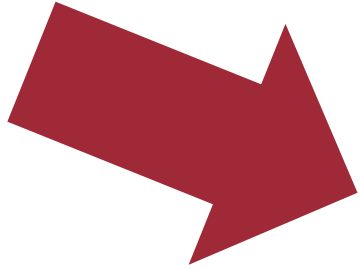

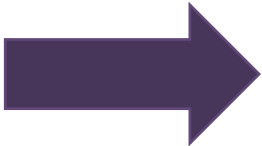

# Applicant Eligibility

Eligible

- US Organizations:
  - 501 (c) (3) Non-profit organizations
  - Units of State/Local Government
  - Federally recognized Tribes or Tribal Communities
- Must have a 3 year history of arts programming

Not Eligible

- Individuals
- Fiscal Sponsors
- Commercial/for profit enterprises

Recommended for funding in FY2022, 2023, or 2024 from:**

- Challenge America Program,
- Arts Engagement in American Communities

- Grants for Arts Projects (Art Works) OR
- Our Town Program OR
- Research Grants Program



*\*Note: All applicants must also meet the general Arts Endowment eligibility requirements related to tax-exempt status, programming history, and reporting requirements.*

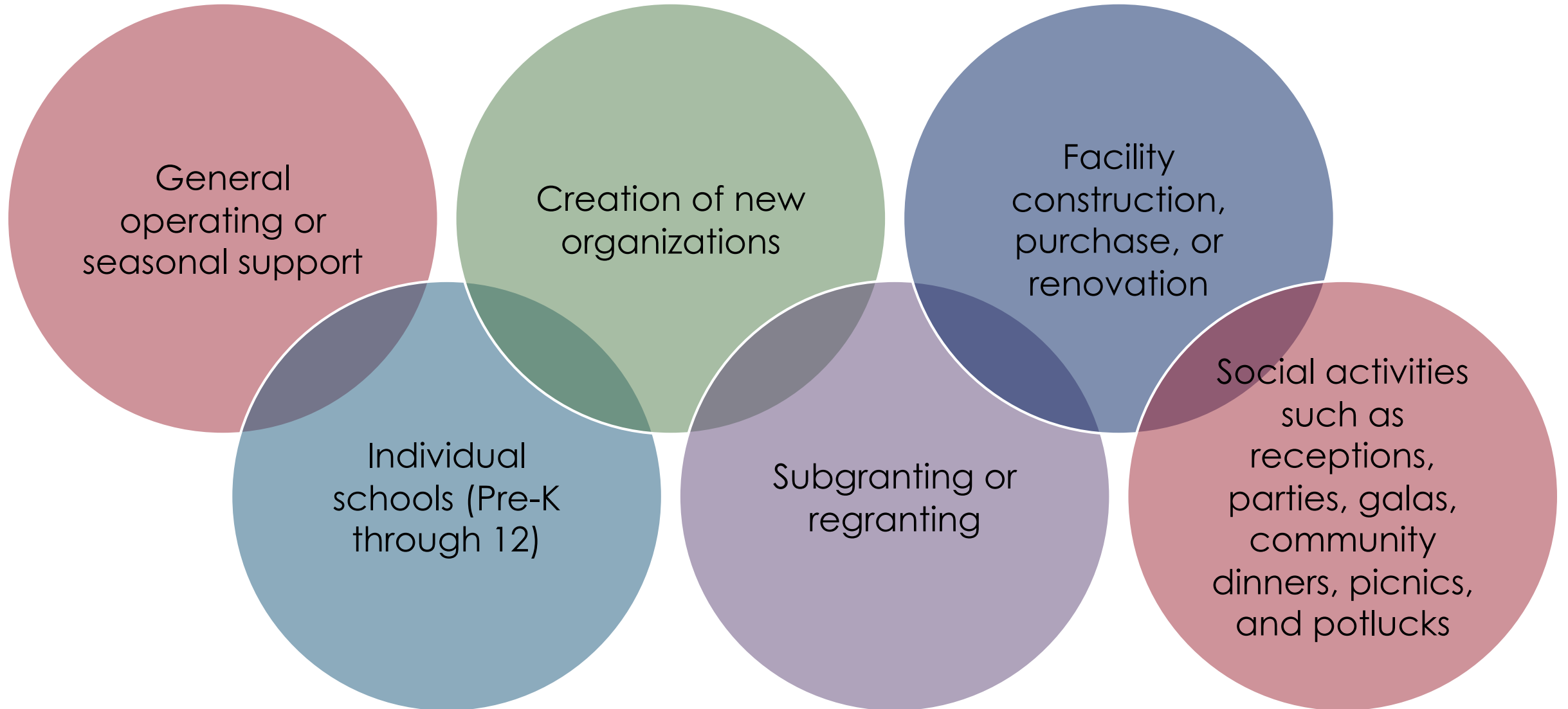

# Compliance Requirements

## Accessibility

- All projects must be both programmatically and physically accessible to individuals with disabilities in accordance with federal law including ADA and Section 504.

## Non-discrimination

- Applications may focus on a particular group or demographic; however, they may not be exclusionary under Federal civil rights laws and policies prohibiting discrimination. This extends to hiring practices, artist selection processes, and audience engagement.

## National Historic Preservation Act & National Environmental Protection Act

# Application Review: Artistic Excellence Criteria

## Artistic Excellence

The quality of the artists and other key individuals, creative process, works of art, organizations, arts education providers, artistic partners, and/or services that the project will involve and their relevance to the audience or communities being served.

# Application Review: Artistic Merit Criteria

The ability of the project to reach and meaningfully engage with underserved groups/communities —those whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited relative to: geography, ethnicity, economics, or disability.

The value and appropriateness of the project to the organization's mission, artistic field, artists, audience, community, and/or constituency.

# Application Review: Artistic Merit Criteria

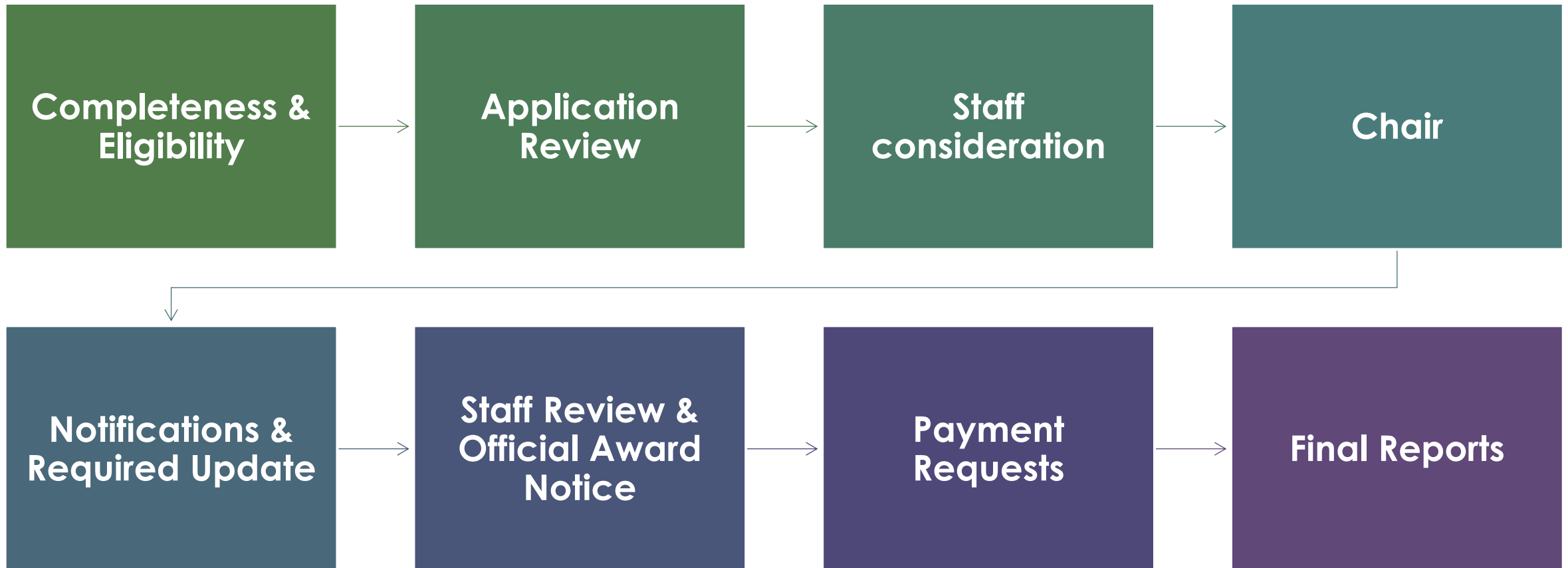
The ability to carry out the project based on such factors as the appropriateness of the budget, clarity of the project activities, the resources involved, and the qualifications of the project's personnel and/or partnerships.

Clearly defined goals and/or proposed outcomes and an appropriate plan to determine if those goals and/or proposed outcomes are met.

## **As applicable:**

- Potential to strengthen the arts sector through knowledge-sharing and resources.
- Potential to make quality arts or cultural resources more widely available.
- Potential of the project to grow organizational capacity and experience.
